Miraculously, for two years as we did this, it never rained on Tuesday nights from 7 to 9 p.m.!

When fall came and it was cold and dark, we talked about resuming the street ministry in the spring, but we were not willing to give it up, so we continued through the winter. One Tuesday we were walking down State Street and stopped to talk to some ladies at the After-incarceration Support Services, and they invited us in to sing for them!

Another week, we decided to go Christmas caroling at the shopping center at Sherman and State Street, stopping at the stores there to sing of our Savior's birth. As we circled up and lifted our voices in praise to our Lord Jesus, we realized that we were drawing a crowd! Others were joining us. I can't remember how many, but I remember a couple and a family with a youngster with them, and they asked if they could join us. They wanted their son to experience what it was like to go Christmas caroling!

What a blessing to be able to share the joy of singing about our Savior with others. One of the people said, "We never hear carolers anymore!" So, this Christmas, find time to go caroling. Bless others by lifting up the true meaning of Christmas.

As I began to write this, seeking God's message that will complete this issue of the Springfield Redeemer, which is the monthly newsletter of Redemption Gate Mission Society, I first thought to list all the aspects of our ministry. I counted eight of them: the morning Bible Study, Student ministry, Recovery Program, open Mic, women's Bible Study on Thursday, Marriage Seminar, Sunday Services, and Saturday lunch! That does not include the summer outreach, Family Day, the annual Thanksgiving Dinner, various seminars, and other things. Then, as I thought on them, I realized that these things

were only the vehicles for our real work, that of redeeming Springfield from its spiritual and the physical poverty that so often follows.

We are here to be Jesus' hands and feet; to feed the hungry spiritual and physical food; to help meet the myriad of needs. We endeavor to create here on State Street a safe place; a place where the Holy Spirit is evident; where the atmosphere is godly; where a person can come and sit with a cup of coffee and study, read the Bible or a good Christian book, and listen to uplifting music. But we could do so much more! God has more in

mind. There are tremendous opportunities here for ministry.

Let me explain. First let me say that everything we offer is donation only, no charge. We expect that if God has blessed you, you will want to give something. Giving shows that you have been blessed and that you believe God will provide more. As we give, He supplies abundantly. Also, our workers here are volunteers. Some 'pay back' for what they have received by helping!

Secondly, we seem to have two kinds of people here: those in need, (often dire need), homeless, recovering addicts, those who are desperate, and the volunteers who feel God has called them to come here to minister and serve. This is their mission field! Some of the second group were once in the first! God changed their lives, and they have become Jesus' disciples through the minstry of Holy Grounds and God's Word, and now their lives have been redeemed.

This is what we're here for, to see Springfield redeemed one person at a time. So we keep coming day after day.

But, there's more to do! Is God calling you to come and volunteer? Perhaps to attend the Bible Study, which is a unique opportunity to grow in God's Word, or if you are knowledgeable in the Word, to share with others. Maybe God would have you serve at the counter and make coffee? Or even sit with someone at the table and encourage them, share God's Word with them, or help in some other way. Our workers are all believers in our Lord Jesus Christ, saved by the blood, and learning to walk in His ways by the power of the Holy Spirit. They come from different area churches. If you live in the area, will you consider visiting us and joining us here in Springfield?
